Dr. Kathryn A. Miller is an Associate Professor at the University of Jordan's *Center for Strategic Studies* and the *Prince Al Hussein bin Abdullah II School of International Studies*. Dr. Miller specializes in religious minorities, international human rights law, and migration in the Mediterranean and Europe.

Dr. Miller received her Ph.D. from Yale University and taught at Wesleyan University and Stanford University from 1998 to 2010. She is a recent recipient of a senior William J. Fulbright Grant, National Endowment of the Humanities Fellowship, American Council of Learned Studies Fellowship, and a fellow at Stanford's *Freeman Spogli Institute for International Studies* for her research in Jordan. She is currently working on two book projects: *Religion and Media in the MENA Region* and *Censorship, Islam, and the West: A Comparative History*.

Dr. Miller has worked as an international studies specialist, historian, and contributor to PBS documentaries and policy studies in the Middle East for the *Center for Strategic and International Studies* (Washington, D.C.) and the U.S. State Department's *Preventative Diplomacy Program*.
